

Kenosha Scholarship Application

The Kenosha Scholarship (Eight awarded)

Eight full-tuition scholarships are awarded to Kenosha residents in recognition of the City of Kenosha's agreement to lease parkland to Carthage for construction of a student village and the lease of land to Carthage for student parking. These scholarships incorporate all Carthage assistance, and are valued in excess of \$140,000. To compete, admitted students must return a completed Kenosha Scholarship application and essay postmarked no later than December 3, 2013.

Qualified applicants also will be considered for the following Presidential Scholarships:

The Lincoln Scholarship (Three awarded)

The Lincoln Scholarship symbolizes the College's strong commitment to students seeking the challenge of the Carthage Honors Program. Named for Abraham Lincoln, an early Trustee of the College, this prestigious scholarship covers full tuition, room and board for up to four consecutive years of undergraduate study—an award worth more than \$180,000. Carthage selects three Lincoln Scholars from the incoming freshman class.

The Clausen Scholarship (Three awarded)

The Clausen Scholarship extends the College's commitment to excellence even further. Named for distinguished alumnus A. W. "Tom" Clausen '44, this prestigious scholarship covers full tuition for up to four consecutive years—an award of more than \$140,000. Carthage selects three Clausen Scholars from the incoming freshman class.

The Ruud Scholarship (Three awarded)

The Ruud Scholarship continues the College's commitment to students exhibiting academic and leadership excellence. Offered through the generosity of Susan (Young '69) and Alan Ruud, this prestigious scholarship covers full tuition for up to four consecutive years of undergraduate study—an award of more than \$140,000. Carthage selects three Ruud Scholars from the incoming freshman class.

The Hay Scholarship (Eleven awarded)

Named for President Lincoln's private secretary and secretary of state for presidents McKinley and Roosevelt, the John M. Hay Scholarship will be awarded to 11 competitors from the incoming freshman class. In tribute to Secretary Hay's leadership and diplomacy, these scholarships will cover 75% of tuition for up to four consecutive years—an award that exceeds \$105,000.

The Lentz/Dahl/Anderson Scholarship (Ten awarded)

Named for Carthage's 15th, 16th, and 17th presidents, Harold Lentz, Erno Dahl, and Alan Anderson '50, these scholarships symbolize the College's strong commitment to students seeking the challenge of a top liberal arts program. These scholarships

will cover 75% of tuition for up to four consecutive years—an award that exceeds \$105,000.

The College's commitment to scholars extends beyond the eight Kenosha Scholarships, and the Presidential Scholarships. Top students typically receive a substantial package of multiple non-need-based awards, ranging from \$5,000 to \$13,000, or more. Many qualify for additional need-based assistance, making Carthage quite affordable. Carthage Honors Program and Kenosha Scholarship Program candidates are selected from among students who are admitted to Carthage and who have submitted the separate Kenosha Scholarship Application along with the required essay, no later than December 3, 2013.

The Office of Admissions screens applications and identifies candidates best suited for the Honors Program and for the Kenosha Scholarship Program. The College notifies these students in January and invites them to campus for a competition on January 24, 2014. This offers a unique opportunity to interact with Carthage faculty, potential classmates, and Carthage Honors students, while competing in the Kenosha Scholarship Program.

During the campus visit, prospective Kenosha Scholars will complete a second essay and have a conversation with two faculty/staff members. Parents are invited to an interactive

session to learn more about the benefits of a Carthage education. The Kenosha and Presidential Scholarship may incorporate all Carthage assistance.

Completing this application also serves as application for the Presidential Scholarship Program.
